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# SENTINEL = FAKE NEWS

Quantavia Hilbert Pulls Ahead Based On Public Sentiments, as False Accusations and Misrepresentations Plague Orange Mayor's Desperate Attempt for 4th Term

Orange residents have been long suffering over the past 12 years under the highly controversial and legally challenged Warren Administration. According to one resident, "I've just had enough of the corruption and FBI investigations in my hometown. It's definitely time for a change and Quantavia Hilbert is our best chance to rebuild Orange."

The latest accusation coming from the mayor's supporters, through a brand new online publication called 'The North Jersey Sentinel' claims that Hilbert is somehow involved in a legal dispute over the sale of one of her businesses. This new unincorporated news entity - just in time to seemingly directed at smearing Warren's formidable opponent Hilbert - neglected to state the case correctly.

"The fact is that my company initiated a lawsuit against the buyers who reneged on our agreement for them to pay us a certain price," said Hilbert in response to the Fake News. "They agreed and broke the agreement while benefiting from our hard work. We sued them, and have a pending date



in court this June. They, then countersued claiming that somehow my being a councilwoman brought some pressure on them. This is as ridiculous as the Sentinel article. We have a right to claim what is rightly ours under the law and we will not settle for anything less.

"It's unfortunate that the Sentinel, initiated by the mayor's legal and public relations supporters, didn't do their due diligence before putting out this Fake News," Hilbert continues.

The current elections in the City of Orange Township have not seen such a closely contested election in the last (Continued on page 12)

# AN ELECTION SEASON IN THE POST-PAYNE ERA

**NEWARK** - Fate has already determined a June 4 party primary winner April 24 here even before most registered voters have given a thought to May 14's nonpartisan municipal elections.

The late Donald M. Payne, Jr., who died here April 24, will win the June 4 Democratic party for the U.S. House of Representatives 10th Congressional District unopposed. His death came four days after the June 4 primary ballots had been printed and mailed.

Payne, 65, had suffered from "a cardiac event" April 9 and was taken to RWJBarnabas Health Newark Beth Israel Medical Center. His Congressional staff said that the event was complicated with his diabetes and high blood pressure. He never recovered from the unconscious and intubated state that he was admitted in.

"DMP, Jr." was a seven-term Congressman who followed in his late father Donald M. Payne, Sr.'s political footsteps. The Hillside High School Class of 1977 graduate was a Newark Municipal Councilman and an Essex County Freeholder who resigned from those positions when he was first elected to Congress - like his father.

The younger Payne won his father's CD-10 seat in a pair of special elections June 5 and Nov. 11. He was running simultaneous-

ly for "DMP Sr" 's" unexpired term plus a full two-year term that started on Jan. 6, 2013.

It will be up to the party chairs of the Essex, Union and Hudson County Democratic Committees to convene a convention after June 17 to pick Payne's successor for the Nov. 5 General Election ballot. The convention delegates will be made up from the 18 municipal chairpersons and ward leaders of CD-10.

Gov. Phil Murphy (D-Rumson) could force Democratic Committee Chairman LeRoy Jones, Jr. and the party's hands by calling a special election to fill what is left of Payne's current term.

Hello Readers,

Hey, it's me: The other guy. Let's get to it...


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# EEN PEOPLE CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY TO DEFRAUD HUNDREDS OF ELDERLY AMERIC

**NEWARK** - Sixteen individuals • were charged in connection with a sprawling "grandparent scam" to defraud hundreds of elderly Americans out of millions of dollars, U.S. Attorney Philip R. Sellinger announced April 30.

Eleven men from the Dominican Republic are charged in a 19count indictment with mail and wire fraud conspiracy; wire fraud; mail fraud; conspiracy to commit money laundering; and money laundering:

- Juan Rafael Parra Arias, aka "Yofre," 40 (in custody)
- Nefy Vladimir Parra Arias, aka "Keko," 39
- Rafael Gonzalez Nelson Acevedo, aka "Nelson Tech,"
- Rafael Ambiorix Rodriguez Guzman, aka "Max Morgan," 59 (in custody)
- Miguel Angel Fortuna Solano, aka "Botija," aka "Boti,"
- Felix Samuel Reynoso Ventura, aka "Fili," aka "Filly The Kid," 36 (in custody)
- Carlos Javier Estevez, 45

- Louis Junior Serrano Rodri- they needed immediate cash for guez, aka "Junior," 27
- Miguel Angel Vasquez, aka "Miguel Disla," 24
- Jovanni Antonio Rosario Garcia, aka "Porky," aka "Chop,"
- Jose Ismael Dilone Rodriguez, 34 (in custody)

An additional five defendants were charged by complaint with wire fraud conspiracy as part of the same scheme: Endy Jose Torres Moran, 21, of Brooklyn, New York; Ivan Alexander Inoa Suero, 32, of the Bronx, New York; Jhonny Cepeda, 27, and Ramon Hurtado, 43, both of New York; and Yuleisy Roque, 21, of Justice Department's Civil Divithe Bronx.

"As alleged, these 16 defendants preyed upon grandparents' familial love and devotion, cheating them out of millions of dollars," U.S. Attorney Sellinger said. "In this 'grandparents' scam,' the defendants allegedly impersonated grandchildren in distress, claiming, for example, they had been arrested after a car accident involving a pregnant woman who later miscarried, and

bail or a lawyer. The panicstricken grandparents quickly paid-sometimes tens of thousands of dollars. My office is committed to protecting the rights of all victims, and we will relentlessly prosecute those who allegedly target vulnerable seniors to steal their hard-earned savings."

"The Justice Department's Consumer Protection Branch and its law enforcement partners will vigorously pursue individuals who prey on vulnerable and elderly victims through fraudulent schemes," Deputy Assistant Attorney General Arun Rao of the sion. Consumer Protection Branch said. "We will continue to identify perpetrators of these schemes and prioritize the pursuit of those who deliberately target vulnerable consumers, whether located in the United States or abroad."

"Today's announcement stems from the defendants' alleged heartless targeting of elderly victims who were collectively tricked into handing over millions of dollars," Department of Homeland Security, Homeland Security Investigations, New York, Acting Special Agent in Charge Darren B. McCormack, said. "For their own selfish gain, these accused individuals threatened innocent Americans' livelihoods, and robbed them of their precious time and any nest eggs they had secured for themselves. I commend HSI New York's El Dorado Task Force Cyber Intrusion Group, the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of New Jersey, the NYPD, the FBI, the Social Security Office of Inspector General, and HSI Santo Domingo for their outstanding collaboration and coordination. This can truly happen to anybody, and while we will always be there to assist victims, we hope that raising awareness will give these criminal opportunists fewer chances to target the public."

"We allege these scammers created an elaborate scheme revolving around a grandchild reaching out to say they were in trouble, had been arrested, and needed help," FBI - Newark Special Agent in Charge James E. Dennehy said. "Then to reinforce an immediate need for cash,

these fraudsters allegedly posed as attorneys, law enforcement officers and court employees explaining how grandparents can get them money. Even the most jaded and savvy of us out there may pause a moment, thinking that this could actually be real. That's the insidious nature of this particular fraud, criminals are preying on our instinct to protect our families. We ask anyone who believes they could also be a victim to report it at www.ic3.gov."

"Fraud targeting the elderly has a uniquely harmful effect on a segment of the population that is often amongst society's most vulnerable," Bradley Parker, Acting Special Agent in Charge, Social Security Administration (SSA) Office of the Inspector General (OIG), Boston - New York Field Division, said. "SSA OIG is proud to join HSI, the FBI, the Justice Department, and the NYPD in investigating these complex, international scams aimed at defrauding SSA beneficiaries."

"These charges underscore law enforcement's commitment to protecting our older population from fraudsters and financial exploitation," New York Police Department Commissioner Edward A. Caban said. "The crimes outlined here are truly depraved in their nature: targeting our parents and grandparents, aunts and uncles, and others in an elaborate venture to bilk them of their hard -earned savings. I applaud our NYPD investigators and all of our federal partners involved in this important case for their tireless dedication to our shared public safety mission."

According to documents filed in this case and statements made in court: Juan Rafael Parra Arias, Nefy Vladimir Parra Arrias, and Gonzalez Acevedo operated a sophisticated network of call centers in the Dominican Republic. Their alleged victims included elderly residents of several states, including New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts. The call centers victimized hundreds of Americans through fraud, stealing millions of dollars.

Members of the conspiracy referred to as "openers" called elderly victims in the United States and impersonated the vic-(Continued on page 14)

National The Football League recently held its annual draft, with the 2024 edition taking place in Detroit. As no surprise to anyone, the Chicago Bears took USC OB and 2022 Heisman winner Caleb Williams with the 1st pick overall. The 2nd pick was the 2023 Heisman winner, LSU QB Jayden Daniels, selected by the Washington Commanders. North Carolina QB Drake Maye made it a clean sweep for the Top 3 being signal callers, as he was selected by the New England Patriots. Ohio State WR Marvin Harrison, Jr. was selected 4th by the Arizona Cardinals, while the Chargers took Notre Dame OT Joe Alt to round out the Top 5.

With the sixth selection, the NY Giants took explosive LSU WR Malik Nabers, who drew comparisons to another LSU star Big Blue once had in Odell Beckham, Jr. Two picks later, the biggest shocker of the whole draft came when, despite signing QB Kirk Cousins to a massive contract this offseason, the Atlanta Falcons too Washington QB Michael Penix, Jr. with the 8th pick. Two picks later, the Minnesota Vikings swapped picks with the NY Jets to move into #10 and took Michigan QB and 2024 National Champion JJ McCarthy.

At #11, the Jets took Penn State OT Olu Fashanu. With the next pick, the Denver Broncos took Oregon QB Bo Nix, meaning that half of the first dozen picks were quarterbacks. The Indianapolis Colts took UCLA DE Laiatu Latu with the 15th pick, which was significant because he was the first defensive player to be selected in the 2024 NFL Draft.

As for local representation, Newark native Mohamed Kamara, who was a four year letterman and played at Central High School, was taken in the 5th Round with pick #158 from the CSU Rams to rush the QB for the Miami Dolphins.

In the NBA, as of this posting, the likes of the LA Lakers, Phoenix Suns, and New Orleans Pelicans have been eliminated from the postseason.

Finally, former USC star running back Reggie Bush had his Heisman Trophy restored after it was taken years ago.

There is still the matter of registered voters in five towns choosing their municipal leaders from among 36 or 37candidates by 8 p.m. May 14.

In ORANGE, there are three people vying to become the city's next mayor and three balloted council members plus a write-in candidate are seeking the three at-large council seats.

Current West Ward Councilwoman Quantavia L. Hilbert and former At-Large Councilman April Gaunt-Butler are challenging incumbent Mayor Dwayne D. Warren. Participating city voters get to choose whether Warren gets a fourth four-year term or if Hilbert or Gaunt-Butler becomes Orange's first woman mayor.

Hilbert is running on her own "Voice for Orange" banner. Gaunt-Buter is on "Community Continuity And Commitment." Warren heads up the "Moving Orange Forward 2024" ticket.

The three people looking to

be re-elected as at-large council members are Wheldon M. "Monty" Montague III, Clifford R. Ross and Adrienne Wooten of "Moving Orange Forward." They appeared to be running uncontested until April 16 - when Derrick Henry launched his write-in campaign.

Henry intends to become Orange's first successful write-in candidate. The current Orange Board of Education member was one of the founding members for the citizens committee that had that school board switch from a mayor-appointed panel to one that is now voter-elected.

In IRVINGTON, three of the four "Team Irvington Strong" incumbents face challengers for their council ward seats.

Incumbent Orlando Glen Vick is being challenged by "North Ward United Progress Ignited " campaigner Yasmin Jones in the North Ward. Incumbent Jamillah Z. Beasley and "Team New Irvington South

# FOUR OFFICERS KILLED IN CHARLOTTE MASS SHOOTING

What started as a routine service of a warrant ended in an incident so tragic it got a response from the nation's highest ranking official.

Between 1-2 p.m. on April 29, U.S. Marshals and an officer with the Charlotte- arrived at a house on Galway Drive to serve a felony warrant to 39-year-old Terry Clark Hughes, Jr. Shockingly, Hughes and another suspect opened fire with an illegally modified AR-15, killing three of the Marshals and the police officer. Four other Marshals were injured in the shootout, which ended after Hughes was shot dead after a SWAT team was called in. The other shooter, who was not identified as of deadline, was taken into custody.

CMPD Chief Johnny Jennings released the names and conditions of CMPD officers wounded in the incident.

CMPD Officer Michael Giglio, hired in February of 2021, was treated for gunshot wound injuries and released from the hospital. CMPD Officer Jack Blowers, hired in February of 2023, was also treated for his gunshot wound injuries and was released from the hospital. CMPD Officer Justin Campbell, hired in June of 2020, sustained injuries resulting in a broken foot. He was treated and released from the hospital. Also, CMPD

Officer Chris Tolley remains in stable condition.

Tragically, Thomas M. Weeks Jr., 48, of Mooresville, North Carolina, died in the line of duty at approximately 1:30 p.m. April 29 when the suspect opened fire on the group of law enforcement officers, killing Weeks and three others.

Weeks was a 13-year veteran of the U.S. Marshals Service (USMS), serving in the Western District of North Carolina for the last 10 years.

Also, Marshals Sam Poloche and Alden Elliot died at the scene, and officer Joshua Eyer was initially in critical condition but died in the hospital several hours later.

The shooting was so tragic, it even garnered the attention of President Biden, who gave a statement.

"Four brave law enforcement officers - including a Deputy U.S. Marshal - were killed in the line of duty. They are heroes who made the ultimate sacrifice, rushing into harm's way to protect us. We mourn for them and their loved ones. And we pray for the recoveries of the courageous officers who were wounded

"When a law enforcement officer puts on that shield in the morning and heads out the door, their family members dread the phone call - the very call that came today. It's like losing a piece of your soul. To the families of those we lost: Jill and I, and all Americans, are here for you. And we will always be here for you.

"We must do more to protect our law enforcement officers. That means funding them - so they have the resources they need to do their jobs and keep us safe. And it means taking additional action to combat the scourge of gun violence. Now. Leaders in Congress need to step up so that we ban assault weapons and high-capacity magazines, require safe storage of guns, and pass universal background checks and a national red flag law.

"Enough is enough. May God Bless these fallen heroes."

# WORLD CAMPUS PROTESTS CATCH GLOBAL EYE

The UN High Commissioner for Human Rights on April 30 said he was troubled by "a series of heavy-handed steps" taken by some universities in the United States to disperse and dismantle Gaza war protests.

In recent days, demonstrations unfolding through tented encampments on school grounds - sparked by students at New York's prestigious Columbia University who are demanding authorities divest from Israel due to its occupation and military assault on Gaza - have spread nationwide.

University authorities from the west to east coast have taken different approaches, ranging from Columbia's initial response to authorize police to clear protests by force to continuing negotiations and allowing the encampments to remain.

Columbia's protesters ignored an ultimatum from the university to leave the camp or risk suspension on April 29. Early the next morning, students took over historic Hamilton Hall on campus, barricading themselves inside.

The building was one of those occupied in civil rights and Vietnam war protests by students in 1968.

The university president announced earlier that dialogue with protesters had failed, and the institution would not bow to demands to divest from Israel.

In his statement on April 30, UN rights chief Volker Türk said that freedom of expression and the right to peaceful assembly were "fundamental to society," particularly when there is sharp disagreement on major issues as there is in relation to the conflict in the Occupied Palestinian Territory and Israel.

He noted that in recent weeks, thousands of university students in the US have been protesting the war, and many demonstrations have taken place without incident.

But, there have also been hundreds of arrests following interventions on some campuses by security forces. Many have subsequently been released while others still face charges or academic sanctions.

"I am concerned that some of law enforcement actions across a series of universities appear disproportionate in their impacts," he stressed.

The rights chief emphasized that any clearly anti-Semitic conduct and speech was totally unacceptable and deeply disturbing. Anti-Arab and anti-Palestinian conduct and speech are equally reprehensible, he said.

"Incitement to violence or hatred on grounds of identity or viewpoints - whether real or assumed - must be strongly repudiated," he continued. "We have already seen such dangerous rhetoric can quickly lead to real violence."

He said any violent conduct should be addressed on a case-by -case basis rather than through sweeping measures "that impute to all members of a protest the unacceptable viewpoints of a few."

Action taken by authorities and law enforcement officials to restrict such expression needs to be carefully scrutinized to ensure they do not go beyond what is demonstrably necessary to protect the rights and freedoms of others or for another legitimate aim, such as the maintenance of public health or order, Mr. Türk said.

"Here, as elsewhere, responses by universities and law enforcement need to be guided by human rights law, allowing

Ward" runner Danouchka Desir are vying for the South Ward seat.

Dr. October Hudley and "East Ward Your Voice Our Mission" Yasmina King are contesting the East Ward. Vernon Cox, barring a write-in campaign, is running unopposed in the West Ward.

**MONTCLAIR** voters meanwhile facing choices for mayor and council in a wholesale turnover. The mayor and all seven council seats are up for grabs every four years.

"Together Montclair" candidate Shivaun Gaines and "Clean Government Advocate" Erik D'Amato are seeking First Ward voters' nod.

Eileen Birmingham, who "Genuinely Cares," and "Montclair Good Government Team" member Ilmar Vanderer are contesting in the Second Ward.

Third Ward voters get to choose among Wendy A. Tiburico, "A New Perspective/ Una Neuva Perspectiva;" Roddy Moore, "Montclair Good Government Team" and Ra-Williams, "Together hurn Montclair."

Former N.J. Attorney Patricia A. Hurt, "Time For A Change:" Aminah Toler. "Montclair Good Government Team" and Zina Floyd "As One We Win" are vying in the Fourth Ward.

Former mayor and current councilman Robert J. "Bob" Russo and former independent candidate Carmel Loughman are running together as the "Montclair Good Government Team." Susan Shin Anderson is the "Together Montclair" candidate.

In BELLEVILLE, one cannot go by ballot slogan alone to determine which candidate is on which ward council ticket -but there will be a wholesale turnover.

Mayor Michael Melham's "A Better Belleville" ticket has fielded unopposed Third Ward Councilman Vincent Cozzarelli for re-election - but does not have its name on his ballot space. "A Better Belleville" are on the northeastern corners of Patricia Inaugurato, Victor D. Mesce and Diana Sorice Guardabasco's lawn signs and

Who will succeed the late independent Marrie Strumolo-Burke is being contested between heir runner "Believe in Belleville" Tracy Juanitia Williams and Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment President Inaugurato.

Gary Hinton, Frank Velez III and Mesce are vying to succeed the outgoing Steven Rovell in the Second Ward. Hinton is "For A Better Belleville;" Former Board of Education Trustee Velez is flying the "Believe in Belleville" banner.

Gadfly and former BOE Trustee Michael Sheldon and Guardabasco are looking to succeed John J. Notari as Fourth Ward Council Member. Sheldon calls himself "A True Fighter For Belleville."

Secondly, the mere fact that only one councilperson supported such a measure speaks volumes about how complacent or comfortable our City Council has become. Henry has challenged the current incumbent at-large slate - Clifford Ross, Adrienne Wooten, and Montague Weldon - to a debate.



**NEWARK** - People who are under 18 years old 11 p.m. - 5:30 a.m. overnight Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, starting May 3, should not venture outside of 100 yards of home into September.

Those who do go beyond 300 feet of home should be ready to state to city authorities that they are going to or from work or be accompanied by an adult or a guardian.

That is the substance of the Summer Safety Initiative 2024 that Mayor Ras J. Baraka had announced, after a week's delay, at City Hall April 25. Although the measure has been annually announced since 1966, this year's edition could be called, "Newark Youth Curfew 2.0."

Newark police officers who encounter unaccompanied youth during those hours, said Baraka that Thursday, will be asked for a parental contact. The said youth will be picked up on-site by the Office of Violence Prevention and Trauma Recovery's Wellness Response Team. Team members will be taken home, or if the parent cannot be contacted, to OVPTR's Re-Engagement Center.

The said youth will be taken to a local hospital for medical clearance before being returned to the REC. Youth - or taken the N.J. Division of Child Protection and Permanency. OVPTR social and outreach workers will visit the families 24 to 48 hours after the NPD encounter.

Repeat incidents over a three

month period could leave families with fines and/or reported to NJDCPP. The revamped program is being integrated with the mayor's Summer of Hope programming and activities.

Summer of Hope includes trips to theaters, block parties, summer youth engagement, workforce development and increased police patrols.

IRVINGTON - Last rites for Valdaishia L. Simpkins - a funeral at Madison's St. Vincent Martyr Church and burial at Summit's St. Teresa's Cemetery - was set for May 2.

Simpkins, 27, was killed by an errant tractor truck while she was inspecting a flat tire along Interstate 80 April 8. She was heading home here after spending Easter with her Pennsylvanian relatives.

Valdaishia La-Teifah Simpkins, who was born in Newark June 25, 1996, attended Northern Elementary before her family moved to Bernardsville. She attended Bernardsville's middle and high schools before graduating with South Orange-Maplewood's Columbia High School Class of 2004.

Simpkins may be best known for helping elderly and/or disabled passengers traverse Newark Liberty International Airport and board or disembark United or JetBlue flights. She was hired through contractor PrimeFlight and was training to become a TSA agent at the time of her death.

Parents Ormond Simpkins, Sr., of Irvington, and Rahseda Belinda Emma Harris, of Summit, brothers Ormond Simpkins, Jr. and Jaden Christopher Harris, sisters Shaquetta Valerie Simpkins, Bernadette Harris and Rasheda Mary Downing, daughters Lauryn Ariel Marshal and Lani Emma Blaise and paternal grandfather Cornell Simpkins, Sr. are among her survivors.

Simpkins' Funeral Mass was simulcast on www.svmnj.org. Memorial contributions may be made towards her daughters' fund.

EAST ORANGE - Although authorities from multiple law enforcement agencies have not said where they had apprehended him April 18, but he will be in Paterson's Passaic County Jail for some time to come.

Eudys T. Santios-Toribio, 23, was picked up that Thursday by members of the Paterson Police Department Shooting Investigation Unit and the State Police and U.S. Marshals NY/NJ Regional fugitive task forces in connection with a Jan. 1 shooting in Paterson.

Paterson Police and the Passaic County Prosecutor's Office supplied information that had linked Santios-Toribio to the shooting of a Prospect Park woman New Year's Day at Market and East 33rd streets.

His description was given to PPD officers by the victim, 25, while she was being treated at St. Joseph's University Medical Center at 4:56 a.m. Jan. 1. She had suffered non-life-threatening injuries.

Santios-Toribio was charged with second and third-degree counts of aggravated assault, possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose and unlawful possession of a weapon.

**ORANGE** - Residents in and around the Orange Valley have been anticipating the results of a mural artist selection for the new PSE&G substation here since 3 p.m. April 27.

Orange stakeholders had the opportunity to select proposals from three Newark area artists here in person at the Forest Street Community School multipurpose room 1-3 p.m. that Saturday. Those who were unable to attend the session at 651 Forest St. could vote in advance or in absentia by a QC code on handbills posted by Arts Committee Orange and the Mayor's Office.

Voters were to consider one proposal each from three Newark area artists: Jacob Mandel, Jazz Pena and Layqa Nuna Yawar. The trio were selected among several submissions received and reviewed, according to the advance press releases, by "Orange stakeholders" and artists.

The awarded artist or artist team would receive a \$50,000 commission to create a mural on a corner of the PSE&G "Orange Heights Switching Station" at 532-36 Freeman St. The three story mural would go up at the corner of Forest and South Jefferson streets.

The mural artist selection process was sponsored by PSE&G, the Mayor's Select

Committee on Art Installations Project and the OAC. The utility, as of April 30, has erected a 70foot facade, resembling fourstory apartment buildings, to surround the soon-to-be-completed switching station.

Orange's Planning Board had approved the two-acre replacement of the former Mitchell -Supreme fuel oil facility in the Orange Valley Arts District with an extension of an existing substation in 2022.

WEST ORANGE - Construction on the new senior citizens building here at 46 Mt. Pleasant Ave has progressed to where the township will start taking residency applications on May 1.


Contractors for the township and redeveloper Joe Alpert have partially replaced the 1959-built West Orange Public Library with a five-story 65-unit apartment building. Demolition of the original WOPL began as soon as its replacement at 10 Rooney Circle, a former office building north of the Essex Green shopping plaza, was repurposed in January.

Remaining is the 1979-built WOPL eastern extension that overhangs the municipal parking lot. (They share a block with Township Hall, the Law and Justice Complex, the John P. Renna senior tower and the site of the old Gaston Street School.)

That 1979 annex is being repurposed as the new senior apartments' community space. One of its to-be-announced uses may be a WOPL branch. Sparing the annex from demolition has an ironic note, since its Jan. 29 facade collapse was cited by township officials in 2022 as a reason for moving WOPL to 10 Rooney Circle. (The facade's bricks pummeled two parked cars as its only damage.)

The project, financed by \$20 million from the New Jersey Home Mortgage Financing Association's Affordable Housing Production Fund, is still set to open later this summer. Housing for 60 of the units are for people at least 62-years-old. Five units are set aside for homeless people - who will have "wrap around" social services.

vibrant debate and protecting safe spaces for all."

The High Commissioner emphasized that any restrictions to fundamental freedoms of expression must be guided by "legality, necessity and proportionality" and applied without discrimination.

"US universities have a strong, historic tradition of student activism, strident debate and freedom of expression and peaceful assembly," Mr. Türk said.

"It must be clear that legitimate exercises of the freedom of expression cannot be conflated with incitement to violence and hatred."

# UNITED KINGDOM UK SANCTIONS UGANDAN OFFICIALS

On April 30, UK Deputy Foreign Secretary Andrew



Mitchell announced sanctions on high profile Ugandan politicians charged with corruption, and the Speaker of the Parliament of Uganda.

It is the first time the UK government has used the Global Anti-Corruption Sanctions regime on individuals involved in corruption in Uganda.

The three individuals, two of whom were previously ministers responsible for Uganda's poorest region, Karamoja, and have been charged with corruption at Uganda's Anti-Corruption Court, will be subject to travel bans and asset freezes.

The two former ministers sanctioned - Mary Goretti Kitutu and Agnes Nandutu - stole thousands of iron sheets used for roofing and infrastructure from a Ugandan government-funded

project aimed at housing some of the most vulnerable communities in the region, providing them to prominent politicians and their families instead.

The Speaker of the Parliament, Anita Annet Among, benefited from the proceeds.

Over 60% of people in Karamoja live in poverty and many suffer from the devastating impacts of drought and insecurity.

Secretary Mitchell said, "The actions of these individuals, in taking aid from those who need it most, and keeping the proceeds, is corruption at its worst and has no place in society. The Ugandan courts are rightly taking action to crack down on those politicians who seek to line their own pockets at their constituents' expense.

"Today the UK is sending a clear message to those who think benefiting at the expense of others is acceptable. Corruption has consequences and you will be held responsible."

The 3 individuals sanctioned:

- Anita Annet Among, who has been the Speaker of the Parliament of Uganda since 2022.
- Mary Goretti Kitutu, who was the Minister for Karamoja Affairs between 2021 and 2024.
- Agnes Nandutu, who was the State Minister for Karamoja Affairs between 2021 and 2024.

These measures follow previous UK sanctions under the Global Anti-Corruption sanctions regime, which has targeted individuals involved in serious corruption cases across the world, including Bulgaria, Lebanon, Moldova, Russia, South Africa, South Sudan, and Venezuela.

Since its introduction in April 2021, the UK has introduced sanctions on 42 individuals and entities under this regime globally to combat corruption across the world.

# NASA-LED STUDY PROVIDES NEW GLOBAL ACCOUNTING OF EARTH'S RIVERS

A study led by NASA researchers provides new estimates of how much water courses through Earth's rivers, the rates at which it's flowing into the ocean, and how much both of those figures have fluctuated over time - crucial information for understanding the planet's water cycle and managing its freshwater supplies. The results also highlight regions depleted by heavy water use, including the Colorado River basin in the United States, the Amazon basin in South America, and the Orange River basin in southern Africa.

For the study, which was recently published in Nature Geoscience, researchers at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Southern California used a novel methodology that combines stream-gauge measurements with computer models of about 3 million river segments around the world.

The scientists estimate that the total volume of water in Earth's rivers on average from 1980 to 2009 was 539 cubic miles (2,246 cubic kilometers). That's equivalent to half of Lake Michigan's water and about 0.006% of all fresh water, which itself is 2.5% of the global volume. Despite their small proportion of all the planet's water, rivers have been vital to humans since the earliest civilizations.

Although researchers have made numerous estimates over the years of how much water flows from rivers into the ocean, estimates of the volume of water rivers collectively hold - known as storage - have been few and more uncertain, said JPL's Cédric David, a co-author of the study.

He likened the situation to spending from a checking ac-

count without knowing the balance. "We don't know how much water is in the account, and population growth and climate change are further complicating matters," David said. "There are many things we can do to manage how we're using it and make sure there is enough water for everyone, but the first question is: How much water is there? That's fundamental to everything else."

Estimates in the paper could eventually be compared with data from the international Surface Water and Ocean Topography (SWOT) satellite to improve measurements of human impacts on Earth's water cycle. Launched in December 2022, SWOT is mapping the elevation of water around the globe, and changes in river height offer a way to quantify storage and discharge.

### 'Fingerprints' of Water Use

The study identified the Amazon basin as the region with the most river storage, holding about 204 cubic miles (850 cubic kilometers) of water - roughly 38% of the global estimate. The same basin also discharges the most water to the ocean: 1,629 cubic miles (6,789 cubic kilometers) per year. That's 18% of the global discharge to the ocean, which averaged 8,975 cubic miles (37,411 cubic kilometers) per year from 1980 to 2009.

Although it's not possible for a river to have negative discharge - the study's approach doesn't allow for upstream flow - for the sake of accounting, it is possible for less water to come out of some river segments than went in. That's what the researchers found for parts of the Colorado, Amazon, and Orange

river basins, as well as the Murray-Darling basin in southeastern Australia. These negative flows mostly indicate intense human water use.

"These are locations where we're seeing fingerprints of water management," said lead author Elyssa Collins, who conducted the analysis as a JPL intern and doctoral student at North Carolina State University in Raleigh.

## A New Way to Quantify Rivers

For decades, most estimates of Earth's total river water were refinements of a 1974 United Nations figure, and no study has illustrated how the amount has varied with time. Better estimates have been hard to come by, David said, due to a lack of observations of the world's rivers, particularly those far from human populations.

Another issue has been that there are many more stream gauges monitoring the levels and flow of large rivers than there are of small ones. There's also broad uncertainty in estimates of land runoff - the rainwater and snowmelt that flow into rivers.

The new study started from the premise that runoff flowing

into and through a river system should roughly equal the amount that gauges measure downstream. Where the researchers found inconsistencies between simulated runoff from three land surface models and gauge measurements taken from approximately 1,000 locations, they used the gauge measurements to correct the simulated runoff numbers.

Then they modeled the runoff through rivers on a highresolution global map developed using land-elevation data and imagery from space, including from NASA's Shuttle Radar Topography Mission. This approach yielded discharge rates, which were used to estimate average and monthly storage for individual rivers and the planet's rivers in total.

Using a consistent methodology enables comparisons in flow and human drawdown between different regions.

"That way we can see where in the world the most amount of river water is stored, or where the most amount of water is being emptied into oceans from rivers," said Collins, now a postdoctoral researcher at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Orange-Maplewood School District Board of Education ended a long April 25 budget presentation by passing its 2024-25 school budget on a 5-4 split vote.

What the school board passed that Thursday night amounted to a \$4,041,835 increase on village and township taxpayers over the outgoing 2023-24 budget. The increase is part of the 7.86 percent of the SOMSD's budget but to be made up through property taxes.

The budget - as revised by the two-town Board of School Estimate and presented by Interim Schools Superintendent Dr. Kevin Gilbert and School Business Administrator Eric Burnside - reflected inflation among maintenance, materials, transportation, home and out-of-district instruction. Student enrollment increased by 132 boys and girls over the 2022-23 school year. There was also an increase of 29 employees on the payroll from 2020.

The New Jersey Department of Education had the budget stay

Once openers duped victims into believing their loved ones were in dire trouble, others working at the call centers, known as "closers," impersonated defense attorneys, police officers, or court personnel and convinced victims to provide thousands of dollars in cash to help their loved ones.

Solano, Reynoso Ventura, and Estevez, typically told victims to give the cash to couriers who they sent to victims' homes to collect their money. Other times, closers instructed victims to send the cash by mail.

Once victims were convinced to give cash, call center "dispatchers," including Serrano Rodriguez, Vasquez, Rosario Rodriguez, and Dilone Rodriguez recruited and managed a network of U.S.-based couriers to steal cash from the elderly victims across the Northeast.

Those U.S.-based couriers, including the five charged by complaint, typically went to the elderly victims' home to retrieve the cash, often using false names and providing victims with fake receipts in exchange. The couriers then brought the cash to other members of the conspiracy, who sent the victims' money back to the Dominican Republic.



Each of the charges in the indictment and complaint carries a maximum potential penalty of up to 20 years in prison. Each of the mail and wire fraud charges also carry a potential fine of up to \$250,000; each of the money laundering charges also carry a potential fine of up to \$500,000.

sion, under the direction of Acting Special Agent-in-Charge Bradley Parker; and the New York Police Department, under the direction of Commissioner Caban, with the investigation leading to the charges. He also thanked the Justice Department's Office of International Affairs.

The government is represented by Assistant U.S. Attorney Carolyn Silane of the Economic Crimes Unit in Newark, and Jason Feldman, Joshua Ferrentino, and Emily Powers of the Department of Justice, Consumer Protection Branch in Washington, D.C.

The charges and allegations contained in the indictment and complaint are merely accusations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

# **DISTRICT OF NEW JERSEY COLLECTS \$214 MILLION** IN CIVIL AND CRIMINAL **ACTIONS IN FISCAL YEAR 2023**

NEWARK - U.S. Attorney Philip R. Sellinger announced today that the District of New Jersey collected a total of \$214 million in Fiscal Year 2023. Of this amount, \$33.4 million was collected in criminal actions and \$13.4 million was collected in civil actions. The district also collected \$91 million in cases the office handled jointly with other U.S. Attorney's Offices and components of the Department of Justice, including \$90.9 million in civil actions and \$60,851 in criminal actions.

In addition, the district recovered \$71.5 million in civil bankruptcy proceedings where individuals and businesses owed debts to federal agencies. And the district, working with partner agencies and divisions, collected \$4.7 million in asset forfeiture actions.

Significant recoveries included a \$14.7 million False Claims Act settlement the District of New Jersey entered into with Biotelemetry Inc. and Lifewatch Services Inc. Both companies were alleged to have knowingly submitted inflated claims for remote cardiac monitoring that were not supported by medical necessity. The district also recovered \$4.25 million in an FCA settlement with Watermark Retirement Communities LLC, a senior living facility alleged to have received kickbacks in return for referrals to a nationwide home health agency which previously settled its liability with the government for \$17 million.

The district's significant bankruptcy recoveries included over \$18 million of delinquent tax debts for the IRS and over \$16 million of outstanding commercial loans for the U.S. Small Business Administration.

The U.S. Attorneys' Offices, along with the department's litigating divisions, are responsible for enforcing and collecting civil and criminal debts owed to the U.S. and criminal debts owed to federal crime victims. The law requires defendants to pay restitution to victims of certain federal crimes who have suffered a physical injury or financial loss.

While restitution is paid to the victim, criminal fines and felony assessments are paid to the department's Crime Victims Fund, which distributes the funds collected to federal and state victim compensation and victim assistance programs. Forfeited assets deposited into the Department of Justice Assets Forfeiture Fund are used to restore funds to crime victims and for a variety of law enforcement purposes. Recoveries in bankruptcy are returned to the federal agencies that are creditors in the case.

Although both were treated from their injuries, one man from Fairfield was arrested on aggravated assault and weapons possession charges.

The first Montclair police units came to 22 Valley Rd. on reports of two pickup truck drivers ramming each other on the lot at 8 p.m. They found two men fighting each other but one with a masonry hammer and a three-foot-long level.

MPD officers separated the pair and called for Montclair and Glen Ridge EMS. The man covered with blood - 58, from Randolph - said that he was told to meet a friend there when his pickup truck was struck from behind by the suspect's truck. Both got out and began arguing.

Witnesses said that the suspect - identified as Giuseppe Iudici, 60, of Fairfield took out his hammer and carpenter's level to beat the victim about the head.

Montclair EMS took the victim to Paterson's St Joseph Medical Center for treatment. Glen Ridge EMS and Montclair Police took the suspect to Mountainside Hospital for his treatment and later arrest.

Iudici was charged with aggravated assault, possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose and unlawful possession. He was remanded to Newark's Essex County Correctional Center until he had posted bail.

BELLEVILLE - Township police officers have one April 30 drug store burglary suspect in custody but are looking for two others who fled.

A BPD unit on patrol said that they had stopped at the Good Health Pharmacy, 305 Joralemon St., at 3 a.m. Tuesday after they had noticed "suspicious activity" inside. They saw three men - two of whom fled out the back door.

A third man - identified as James Lowe, 37, of Jersey City - was nabbed after a foot chase. He was arrested and detained in the Essex County jail on burglary and resisting arrest charges.

Although BPD has not given a description of the other two suspects as of press time, they had a 1999 Honda Odyssey impounded as evidence. A check discovered that the minivan was wearing fictitious license plates.

None of the pharmacy's inventory has been reported as missing.

Lowe is being investigated for connection with any other recent drug store burglaries here.

NUTLEY - The case of the bank employee here who allegedly stole \$105,000 in retirement benefits from a dead customer, said federal officials, has entered the sentencing phase.

U.S. Attorney Philip Sellinger, on

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April 18, said that Jorge Nova, 35, of Passaic, had pleaded guilty in federal court-Newark April 17 to one count of wire fraud before U.S. Magistrate Judge Evelyn Padin.

Nova was an employee of a commercial bank here in 2014 where one of his customers had received Social Security Administration benefits directly deposited to his account. Sellinger said that Nova did not inform SSI of his customer's death and the monthly checks kept coming.

Sellinger said that Nova, until October 2018, tapped into the dead man's account with fraudulent debit cards that he made out in the deceased's name. He was also accused of creating a second account in the man's name with "a money service provider" to withdraw funds from.

Nova's sentencing by Padin is set for Oct. 8. He faces up to 30 years' imprisonment and a maximum \$250,000 fine.



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
